Michael Cardozo:

NYC's Top Lawyer Remembers CW, Trips

Like many Winnebagans who have spent summers both as camper and counselor, when looking back today Mike Cardozo remembers the latter most fondly, in particular the summer of 1960, when he returned to Camp as a counselor in Bunk 2 and a member of the tennis staff. He paddled the Cobbossee Stream and climbed Mt. Katahdin that summer, and credits those trips and the many during his five camper years, especially the Allagash, with instilling in him a life-long love of the outdoors.

Nothing of those summers prepared him for the work he does today as a lawyer overseeing a caseload of 90,000 lawsuits and legal matters being handled by 650 attorneys. Michael Cardozo serves as Corporation Counsel for the City of New York. Chosen by Mayor Bloomberg at the start of his administration, he has been serving in that post longer than anyone in over a century.

"I have the greatest job in the world," he says, and takes great pride in having helped advance Mayor Bloomberg's agenda, particularly in several high profile issues, including control of the educational system and health and environmental issues such as the posting of nutritional data in restaurants and the ban on smoking in public places.

Another big area that Mike has been pleased to be a part of is the development of the two new stadiums now under construction in the city. Perhaps the athletic interest was developed playing on the baseball

fields of Fayette. It was certainly nurtured during the years before his current assignment when, as a partner at Proskauer Rose LLP, he co-chaired the Sports Law Group, which represented most of the major sports leagues in the United States, pioneered the field of sports law, and handled major class action suits.

Michael Cardozo grew up on Manhattan's West Side, at 71st Street and Columbus Avenue. When he was 12, his family moved to Westport, Conn., where he attended public school. After receiving his undergraduate degree at Brown University, he went to Columbia Law School, where he was a member of the *Law Review*, a student adviser, and a Harlan Fiske Stone Scholar.

Mike admits that he found the weight of his family's history at Columbia a bit daunting when he arrived at the Law School. There was a class in which, "the professor would call on someone to talk about

one of Benjamin Cardozo's cases," recalls Mike, "and he would say, 'Don't worry, we have Cardozo waiting in the wings to explain it.' I can still remember quaking in my seat."

"People thought I would be a lawyer from the time I was in high school. I guess I acted like a lawyer, however a lawyer acts when he's in high school," Mike says. Michael H. Cardozo, his grandfather, graduated from Columbia Law School in 1904. His father, Harmon H. Cardozo, attended Columbia as an undergraduate. And his grandfather's first cousin was Benjamin Cardozo, the renowned New York jurist and U.S. Supreme Court justice.

It was Mike's expertise in commercial litigation and his broad knowledge of New York politics that brought him to the attention of the newly elected Mayor Bloomberg in 2001. It was also his record of leadership in legal organizations and on special task forces. From 1996-98, he was president of the Association of the Bar of the City of New York and, in 1999, he was elected chairman of the Committee and Fund for Modern Courts, a citizen-based organization dedicated to improving the quality and administration of justice in New York.

He has served, by appointment of Governor Mario Cuomo and former New York State Court of Appeals Chief Judge Sol Wachtler, on task forces and committees charged with overseeing judicial administration. What Mayor Bloomberg didn't know - or didn't care to ask - was Mike's party affiliation. In fact, at

From the Association President—A “W.I.” to All

Hello everyone— The 2008 Summer of Challenge was full of smile, pep and vim, and it was also such a great pleasure for me to be back again on the shores of Echo Lake. It was as Winnebagan a summer as I am ever going to have. The campers and staff were loving, giving, happy, adventurous, and really “got” camp. They kept me engaged and kept me young.

I do have something to tell you involving camp and me, and in this 21st Century, while not the best way, it's a way of “speaking” with all of you at once. This coming summer is going to be my last at Winnebago. Last winter I received an unsolicited job offer from St. Catherine's to become the Director of Technology and I accepted that offer.
